FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART

Grace to you, and Peace, from God and our Lord Jesus, the Christ.

I am writing from the Pittsburgh Airport, where I am waiting for a flight for the Thanksgiving Holiday. Just over a week ago, there were a series of terrorist attacks



in Europe and the Middle East. The U.S. has travel warnings for anyone traveling overseas....and the arguments continue here in the U.S. about our government's abilities to contain threats and protect us from all who would harm us.

The reactiveness among people is understandable....we have seen the death and havoc that terrorists create. Fear is natural. It is a protective device wired into our bodies when we feel threatened...the fight or flight response is powered by a release of chemicals that flows through our veins, putting our bodies on "high alert." Just take a moment and listen to your body the next time you watch a show on TV that has you "on the edge of your seat." Unfortunately, these reactions can also wreak havoc on our bodies, our psyches, and our relationships when it is sustained for a period of time.

Men and women who have served in battles in war, those who have survived a traumatic experience or who have survived a bout of cancer, all know the cost of being under the constant stress of a threat – it is exhausting! Our generation is not the first to know this stress. However, with the constant din of TV, social media, and our computers, we are surrounded by the news of threats 24/7. It isn't healthy for us.

I would encourage you to "unplug" regularly, give yourself a break from the relentless threats, and immerse yourself in things that calm you, give you joy, and help you to relax.

Take a few minutes a day to breathe deeply, clear your mind, and be present in the moment of time God has given you.

Throughout the story of God's people, God sends messengers (we call them angels) and their first words are "Fear Not!" Jesus told his followers, "Do not be anxious" and when he appeared to them after his resurrection, his words were "Peace be with you." God knows how stress can affect us, how fear can disable us and God longs to give us that "Peace that passes understanding."

As you enter into your holiday season, as we prepare to celebrate the coming of our Lord, Jesus Christ, take care of yourself and those around you. Unplug regularly, turn off the voices of relentless threat, and turn to God, who sends you his own Son to bring Peace. It isn't the peace that the world can ever give, it is the Peace of knowing that no matter what may come, we are safe and secure in our Heavenly Father's keeping. The Peace that comes from knowing that nothing can ever separate us from the Love of God, which is ours in Jesus Christ.

Our God chose to come to us in the form of a babe, vulnerable to the hatred of the powerful who threatened him with harm. He grew up in a poor, migrant family, who sought refuge in a foreign land, and his own people did not recognize him and would not receive him. Join us for worship, study and prayer, on Sunday mornings as well as the special days of the season.

May we be open to whatever way our God chooses to come to us this holy season. May we recognize that God occasionally sends us messengers of peace when we least expect it, through the unlikely people we might label "strangers" or "aliens."

May the Peace that passes all understanding give you Joy in the midst of grief and pain, Confidence in the midst of fear and anxiety, and Agape Love, which holds all things together, in Him who is Love.

NIGHT OF PEACE

I am very excited to share with everyone a new choral piece I call, "Night of Peace." I finished composing this piece in August. I was inspired to write this piece in response to the chaos that seems to have overtaken our world. I wanted to express my feeling that the peace of Christmas is needed now more than ever.

The peace we need is not just the opposite of war, but also peace from the hectic overbearing 24/7 days the era of the internet and social media has brought us. Personally I have been trying to refrain from looking at my Facebook more than once a day. Longing for a simple time when the end of the day was a time to wind down, not a time to catch up with all the emails and posts I missed while I was teaching. 
