FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART

Celebrating the Past...and at the same time...

Looking ahead to what God has planned for us!

In May we will be kicking off our season of Celebration of 225 Years of Ministry here at Trinity! Wow 225 years! It is hard for me to get my brain wrapped around that!



The beginning of our celebration, May 24, has more to do with an opening in the Bishop's schedule than anything else, yet it is absolutely appropriate that we kick start our celebration on Pentecost, which is often called Pentecost the "Birthday" of the Church.

When the Holy Spirit visited the disciples at Pentecost, they had been gathering for some time, waiting for the promises of Jesus to be fulfilled. He had said that he would send them a partner in ministry, who would provide all that was necessary for them to fulfill the Great Commission: to go out and proclaim the Good News of God's Love in Jesus Christ, to Baptize and Teach all that Jesus had commanded them. They were to go out from Jerusalem to the four corners of the world....

In the same way, folks had been gathering for some time as Lutherans in Somerset, at multiple preaching points, including our sister congregation in Friedens. At one point, perhaps because of a recorded Baptism, a notation in an official record or an article in the newspaper, the year 1789 was adopted as "the birthday" of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in Somerset, even though Lutherans were gathering in the area, for a number of years.

It is hard to imagine what life might have been like at the time. There was no larger Lutheran organization like the ELCA to assist with a mission start. No analysis of growth potential, no specialized pastors or funding that could purchase the first property or keep a mission start going through the early years.

Churches were begun because someone in Germany thought it was important to send out missionaries into the new territories in the fledgling United States. Someone in this little hamlet gathered a few of their German Lutheran friends together to listen to a preacher coming through town. They rejoiced to hear the Gospel. Perhaps they took up a collection to have a Lutheran pastor come back, to preach, teach, baptize, commune, marry, and bury folks in the Lutheran tradition. Eventually, a regular worship schedule was established and the first of several buildings to house the young church, was built...and the rest, they say, is history! As St. Paul said it, "there is a great cloud of witnesses who have come before us" and to whom we owe a great debt."

We will be exploring the 225 year history of this congregation over the next few months. I hope to learn more about what life was like for those establishing a new church in a rugged country that was Somerset so many years ago! I am looking forward to hearing more about the history of our town and this congregation through Sunday School programs, special events for the whole community, worship services, and dedicatory events. I hope that YOU will become involved in this celebration!

For, we have inherited a great history. We are called to be faithful in our time, and eventually, to pass it on to those who will come after us! So, let's Celebrate the past, but also, look ahead to what God is doing here!!

AN INVITATION . . .

Bob and I just returned from a vacation trip to Mexico. It was warm and welcoming but also, a bit daunting, to travel where we didn't know the language. Fortunately, many of the native folk also spoke English and took good care of us. We had a lot of help, and that made all the difference in the world!

When we don't know the language we miss out on opportunities, we feel uncomfortable and vulnerable – there are so many ways that others could take advantage of our situation! We miss social cues, have difficulty communicating our needs, and our intentions. Misunderstandings are common, and it is frustrating to accomplish the simple tasks of getting transportation or making purchases.

You may be aware that we have in our larger community, a

number of Hispanic folk who have limited ability to speak English. Some work in local restaurants and others are working on area farms. Not being



able to speak English leaves a person vulnerable in a number of ways and limits their ability to participate fully in our community. It is isolating and challenging to navigate the basic activities of life when you cannot understand the language.

Fortunately, there are teachers available, and students who are anxious to learn. Making sure that folks have access to classes is a challenge – and I am making an invitation to Trinity members who might like to help, to let me know. Some students are out on Somerset County farms and need transportation in to take a class. Some of these young people are living isolated lives, working long hours. If you would be willing to help provide some help, I would be happy to help coordinate. YOU can make a real difference in someone's life simply by offering a ride to and from a class once or twice a month. Just let me know!

VIEW FROM THE LOFT

Whistle Down the Wind

I recently got ahold of the original cast recording of the musical, "Whistle Down the Wind." I had been trying to obtain this for guite some time as it was written by Andrew Lloyd Webber and Jim Steinman, the latter being one of my favorite composers/lyricists of all time (commonly known for writing most of Meatloaf's material and famous songs like "Total Eclipse of the Heart"). However, when I listened to the musical, I was surprised to find it to be quite a thought provoking sacred work.

The libretto is based on a book by Mary Hayley Bell. The show takes place in Louisiana in 1959. The story is focused on a fundamentalist church-going family. The children of the family are all named after birds, and we soon find out that their mother passed away recently. The first scene takes place just after church, and it is close to Christmas. The children sing a song, "I Never Get What I Pray For" which expresses the way children view church teachings differently than adults. The song takes on a serious topic in a humorous way:

"I never get what I pray for, I can pray for less or a whole lot more. it don't ever matter, it's a sure bet! That I never get what I pray for... An end to the horrors of the atom bomb, or a dance with Ricky Nelson at the homecoming prom..."

After the song, the children meet a group of strangers to their small town who say they have come for a "revival meetin" on Christmas Day. The leader of the traveling groups tells the children, "You gotta be ready, to wrestle with the devil in a heartbeat!"

When the children go home, their father informs them to stay away from the newcomers because "Some folk have some funny ideas on how to test their faith in Jesus including wrestling with serpents." The next day the town is informed by the sheriff that there is an escaped convict on the loose and the state police will be coming to town after Christmas to look for him. In the meantime, everyone must be very careful. Swallow, the oldest girl of the children, goes to the barn to tend to the animals only to discover a strange man hiding in the barn. When she sees the man she cries, "Who are you?" In surprise and alarm that he has been discovered the man attempts to cuss exclaiming "Jesus Christ!" However, the sheltered and innocent Swallow HIS Name is

at church that Jesus will be returning soon. The man says, "Don't tell anyone I'm here; they'll kill me!" Swallow says, "I know... just like how they crucified you!" So she agrees to

Swallow cannot resist telling her brothers and sisters about "Jesus." The children begin discussing what it would mean if the mysterious man really was Jesus Christ, and what a difference it would make to their lives. They sing the song, "Long Overdue for a Miracle."

The rest of the show continues with many plot developments, but depicts in a powerful way how the idea of Jesus being back changes the behavior and lives of all around. At the end of the show, the sheriff discovers the secret and informs the town. The townspeople gather having just attended the revival meeting exclaiming, "We gotta be ready to wrestle with the devil in a heartbeat!" When the townspeople get to the barn, they find it surrounded by the children who are determined not to let them hurt "The Man." Swallow is trapped in the barn with him, and he says he will take her

hostage, but quickly changes his mind and instead pushes her out of the barn to safety. Left alone, he sets fire to the barn, so that when Swallow manages to get back in, there's no trace of him left. Swallow is convinced he hasn't left for good, saying, "He'll be back...I just know he will." Her father tries to make her see that he wasn't Jesus. She still isn't completely convinced, asking, "But how do you know?" Then the final and most famous song from the musical, "No Matter What," is sung:

"No matter what they tell us, no matter what they do
No matter what they teach us, what we believe is true.
I can't deny what I believe, I can't be what I'm not.
I know this love's forever, I know no matter what.
I can't deny what I believe, I can't be what I'm not.
I know this love's forever,
that's all that matters now no matter what."

The play itself never really truly tells the audience if "The Man" was the convict or if he was really Jesus or maybe even an angel. I found the story to be quite thought provoking and the music to be top notch. I wanted to share the story as this musical is not one of the more famous ones, but it is one of my personal favorites.

EASTER MESSAGE

"So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them." (Mark 16:8)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Gospel of Mark ends abruptly. The women came to the tomb to care for the body of their friend and Lord. They expected death. Seeing the stone rolled away, they entered the tomb; they entered into death. They didn't find Jesus. Instead, they saw a young man, who told them not to be amazed, that Jesus had risen. This same stranger told them to tell the disciples and then head to Galilee. Is it any wonder that terror and amazement seized them?

We are on the other side of the first Easter. We have grown used to the story of the resurrection. The good news brings hope and comfort. It brings freedom and joy. But I don't think it causes terror and amazement. Maybe we are missing something. The Greek word for amazement, "ekstasis," means "change of place." And that is what has happened to us and all of creation because of the resurrection. Before Easter, we stood in a place of sin and death. After Easter, we stand in a place of forgiveness and life. Everything has changed. We are not the same. The world is not the same. The deadly, but familiar, way of the world can no longer be counted on. This new reality of forgiveness, life and salvation is and should be unsettling. Terror and amazement indeed!

The world is turned upside down. It might look the same, but we are standing in a different place. Christ is risen. We are risen. Alleluia!



This includes anyone working in the Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, working with Acolytes, Child Care Workers, etc. If you already work with children through your job and have any of these clearances, please forward a copy of them to Trinity's Office as soon as possible. FROM THE VICAR'S DESK

Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

Easter is not a day, but a season of the year, a seven-week season. Easter Sunday begins a season in the church year that ends with Pentecost Sunday, the day Christians remember the outpouring of the Holy Spirit



upon the earliest believers in Jesus. More on that later.

Throughout the season, there are some obvious signs we are still in Easter. For one, the paraments stay the color of bright gold. And we try to keep the Easter lilies around for as long as we can. We sing Easter hymns throughout the weeks of the Eastertide. The ELW, and other resources, have so many amazing Easter hymns, and we get to enjoy them for seven weeks! It may feel weird to sing, "Christ the Lord is Risen today" in May, but I think living in this Easter season for so long enables us to reflect on what Jesus' resurrection means to us.

Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed! On Easter Sunday, we celebrate this good news, rediscovering for ourselves what the earliest followers of Jesus realized on that first Easter Sunday. Yet this is big stuff to try and ponder for one day, so we have weeks to do so!

The season of Easter gives us a chance to reflect more broadly and deeply on the complex meaning of the resurrection of Jesus. Our readings for each week help us to do this. We hear about the first apostles that experienced the resurrected Christ. We read about their fear, their confusion, and how experiencing the risen Christ changed their lives and sent them out to proclaim the good news. We hear the story of Jesus as the good shepherd, confirming the promises that Christ lays down his life for all of us. We learn that Jesus is

the vine, and we are the branches; as disciples, we bear much fruit. Jesus tells us to keep God's commandments, and gives us his commandment: to love one another as I love you. And in the last week of Easter, we celebrate Jesus' ascension.



The next week we celebrate the day of Pentecost. Pentecost is a holiday on which we commemorate the coming of



the Holy Spirit on the early followers of Jesus. Before the events of the first Pentecost, which came a few weeks after Jesus' death and resurrection, there were followers of Jesus, but no movement that could be meaningfully called "the church." Therefore, Pentecost is the day

on which the church was started, or the church's birthday.

The event of Pentecost is recorded in the Bible, the Acts of the Apostles. Chapter 2 begins, "And when the day of Pentecost had come, [the first followers of Jesus] were all together in one place." (2:1) All of a sudden, a sound came from heaven, like a strong wind, filling the house where the people had gathered. Something like tongues of fire rested on their heads. "And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as the Spirit gave them the ability to speak."

On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit descended on individual followers of Jesus as they were gathered together in Jerusalem. This gathering became the first Christian church. New believers in Jesus were baptized as they joined this church. They shared life together, focusing on teaching, fellowship, breaking of bread, and prayer. They shared their belongings so that no one was hungry or needy. They lived out their new faith together.

So what does Pentecost mean to us today? Christians are meant to live in the presence and power of the Spirit of God. The Holy Spirit helps us to confess Jesus as Lord, empowers us to serve God, binds us together as the body of Christ, helps us to pray, and even intercedes for us with God the Father. The Spirit guides us, helping us to live like Jesus.

Pentecost presents us with an opportunity to consider how we are living each day. Are we relying on the power of God's Spirit? Are we attentive to the guidance of the Holy Spirit? Most Christians try to live in the presence and power of the Spirit, but only to an extent. We are limited by our fear, our sin, and our low expectations, not to mention our tendency to be distracted from God's work in us. Pentecost offers a chance to confess our failure to live by the Spirit and to ask the Lord to fill us afresh with his power.

The spirit was poured out on the followers of Jesus when they were gathered together. This emphasizes the centrality of the church in God's work in the world. The Holy Spirit is given to individuals, as well as to a gathered people of

God. The community of God's people is central to God's work in the world. Pentecost invites us to consider our own participation in the fellowship, worship, and mission of the church. It is a



time to renew our commitment to live as an essential member of the body of Christ, using our gifts to build the church and share the love and justice of Christ with the world. We are to be a community in which all people are drawn together by God's love in Christ. We are all one in Christ Jesus. Each person matters and contributes to the health and mission of the church. The Holy Spirit is given to all people, empowering us to minister to the world. We work together to be the hands that do God's work in the world.

Go in peace to love and serve the Lord. Thanks be to God!

KENYA MARCH NEWSLETTER

Women's Sunday

Nairobi International Lutheran Congregation (NILC) had an absolutely wonderful Women's Sunday worship celebration on March 1st!

A little background: The Kenya Evangelical Lutheran Church (KELC), the ELCA's companion church body, designates the 1st Sunday in March as Women's Sunday in concert with the global ecumenical celebration of the World Day of Prayer. We adapt the liturgy and theme from the World Day of Prayer and work to make it informative and relevant to our setting.

This year's theme was the Bahamas, and we learned about the beauty of those islands, the

special needs that Bahamian women have, and how the people of the Bahamas are striving to care for their precious natural environment.



This was our 3rd Women's Sunday here in Kenya. At the first, we had a regular worship service led by the male pastor with a woman preacher. At the second, an ELCA seminary educated female Kenyan pastor took a strong lead and organized and led the service. This year NILC women were firmly and wonderfully in control of both planning and execution: leading the liturgy, saying the prayers, doing the children's message, and having the sermon by a local woman leader of International Bible Study Fellowship.

The women read through the liturgy which was provided by KELC's Women's Desk, and it was exciting to see that one woman especially wanted to pray for the preservation of the Bahamian seas; while another woman wanted to pray for health care of Bahamian girls and women; while yet another woman wanted to pray for women and children, particularly single women raising children, and so on. It was our sense

that these NILC women felt a sisterly closeness to the concerns for which they were praying on behalf of people, especially women, in the Bahamas.

A key goal of ours as we serve at NILC and with KELC is to transition the congregation to local leadership after many years of leadership by Americans. Women's Sunday was not only a terrific celebration for, of, and by women at NILC but it was also a striking moment of leadership by strong local women. Thanks be to God!

NOTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SOMERSET AREA FOOD PANTRY

The financial health of the Somerset Food Pantry is excellent. During the past year, the Pantry has had receipts of \$151,909.66 and total disbursements of \$219,902.91. The current balance is \$133,532.35.



The disbursements were almost completely for food purchases, with minimal costs for administrative expenses, tax preparation, and filing fee. Our receipts consisted of cash contributions, increase in the value of stocks held, interest, and dividends. Approximately \$11,000 of income came from Pennsylvania State and approximately \$67,400 in donated food.

People Served in the Past Year: (April 2014–March 2015)

5,017 families representing 2,462 individuals (Children, adults and seniors)

Total served since the start of the program: 84,704 families representing 215,275 individuals

These families and individuals have come from Somerset County: Hollsopple to Markleton and Stoystown to Champion.

The Food Pantry is able to operate only because of the valuable service of all its volunteers! We have 73 volunteers that serve in the following capacities: Board of Directors, Site Director and Assistant, Interviewers, and Packers. Those who keep inventory, order food, do the loading and unloading of supplies, organize the shelves, and keep statistics --- these volunteers work all week long, not just on Wednesday mornings.

At the Annual Meeting and Luncheon, on Wednesday, April 8, the Board members heartily thanked the Volunteers for their hard work. TOGETHER, we make a valuable contribution to the health and welfare of our fellow citizens here in Somerset.

Trinity is well represented among the volunteers: George Stein (Site Director), Bill Kuhlman, Bob Thomas, and Ann Persun serve on the Board. Interviewers and Packers include: Tom Anderson, Deb Stewart, Flor Hernandez, Don Voytish, Barb Swanson, Sue Weimer, and Jim Baker. By virtue of their normal responsibilities as well as volunteering their own time, our staff members provide additional support: Ann Voytish, Darlene Schafer, Doug Fanale, Frank Kyle, Vicar Jen Soltis, and Pastor Linda.

Trinity provides a great deal of support by providing electricity 24/7 for the refrigerators and freezers, the Food Pantry storage room, the back hallway and use of Adult III for Interviews and overflow storage. Our staff fields requests for food throughout the week between Food Pantry days; answers questions via phone; assists in the loading and unloading of food donations from other churches, individuals, and organizations; and sets up and cleans up each week.





PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY





MALARIA UPDATE

Lutherans are helping to change the world through a campaign that began in 2009 and will end on January 31, 2016... the \$15 million ELCA Malaria Campaign. Over \$13.5 million has been raised with amazing results in 13 African countries.

- Since 2000, global efforts to fight Malaria have slashed the death rate in Africa in half. In South Sudan even though they were struck by war and conflict in late 2013, the malaria program has been able to continue by providing insecticide-treated nets.
- Mortality rates are lower due to low-cost, high-impact measures of making mosquito nets and antimalarial drugs easier to access. Mosquito-breeding habitats are being removed. More than 100,000 people have been tested and, if positive, treated on the spot for malaria in Uganda.
- Education is teaching people symptons of the disease and recognizing that seeking treatment early is imperative to prevent blindness. Nearly 2 million people in Tanzania have learned how to protect themselves and their families from malaria through education and awareness messaging.
- Five years ago, a child under 5 died from malaria every 45 seconds. Today one dies every 60 seconds—an improvement, but there is much to do.
